COMMAND SERGEANT MAJOR (RET.) LYLE WILHELM WOLD (MARCH 26, 1952-JULY 27, 2024)

Lyle was born in Portland, Oregon, and raised by Roy and Marjorie Wold in North Plains, Oregon. He was active in FFA and joined the Oregon Army National Guard in January 1970, the year he graduated from Hillsboro High School. During the course of his military career, he was a member of the 162th Engineer Company, serving as Squad Leader, Platoon Sergeant, Operations Sergeant, and First Sergeant. He was also First Sergeant for the 241st Military Intelligence Company, and Operations Noncommissioned Officer for the 41st Infantry Brigade and Oregon Joint Forces Headquarters G-2 (Intelligence). He deployed to Iraq in 2003 with the 82 Rear Operations Center, serving as the Command Sergeant Major of LSA Anaconda, Balad, Iraq.

In 2004, Lyle joined the 104th Division (IT) at Fort Vancouver, Washington, serving as the Operations and Training Sergeant Major, then as acting Division Command Sergeant Major before retiring from active military service in 2012. He then worked as a Department of Defense Civilian Technician for the Army Corps of Engineers, Portland District Office, until his retirement in September 2023.

Lyle's military awards include the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal (three awards), Army Commendation Medal (nine awards), Army Achievement Medal (eight awards), Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal (nine awards), National Defense Service Medal (three awards), Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal w/ M Device and four 10-year Devices; NCO Professional Development Ribbon w/ Numeral 4, and Overseas Service Bar (third award).

Lyle and his wife of 34 years, Terri, enjoyed road trips all around the United States and Canada; he was an avid historian, and enjoyed museums and historical sites of all kinds. He was most in his element in the outdoors, enjoying hiking, fishing, and golf.

Lyle was a former member of Active 20-30 International, a youth service organization, and a life member of the American Legion; the Veterans of Foreign Wars; the

Enlisted Association of the National Guard of Oregon; the Enlisted Association of the National Guard of the United States; Voiture 40 et 8, and the Oregon Grange, Washington #313.

Lyle is survived by his wife, Terri; stepsons Jeremy Langford (Michayla Dabney) of Port Orchard, Washington, and Bradley Langford (Jennifer) of Poulsbo, Washington; three grandsons, one step grandson, and four step-granddaughters; sister Holly (Guetling) of Evansville, Indiana, and brother David (Robin) of Rigby, Idaho.

HELLO TO ALL!

If you're not a member of our Facebook group, you've probably been wondering why last year's second edition (vol. 13, no. 2) is just now arriving. We delayed its publication to accommodate our battlefield tour last October and to give you a heads-up about 2025's reunion. The first edition for this year (Winter/Spring, vol. 14, no. 1) will be arriving later this spring, once we have the forms ready for reunion registration, and will include a recap of the "Baptism of Fire" tour in the Netherlands. Per usual, we will be enlisting the assistance of Armed Forces Reunions with this. (The forms will be provided on our website too: Timberwolf104Inf.org.)

I must say that I missed seeing people at a reunion in 2024, but the overseas battlefield tour was a very successful one. I know some of you were disappointed that the tour filled up so quickly, but we plan to offer another in the future.

The venue for this year's reunion is the Monarch Hotel in Clackamas, Oregon (MonarchHotel.cc), close to Portland and the PDX airport, with the tentative dates of October 7–12 nearly set. We realize this is a little later than usual, but we think it may be better for attendance, considering busy summer schedules. One reunion highlight will be a visit to the former site of Camp Adair and its memorial park, as well as a review of the ongoing efforts of Adair Living

History (AdairHistory.org) to create an interpretive center commemorating the 104th and the other WWII divisions that trained there.

When it comes to preserving our Timberwolf history, we're also looking to our official repository at Fort Douglas Military Museum in Salt Lake City and the years of work done by our beloved NTPA Historian Kathy Clark, who passed away last January. She did a massive amount of 104th research for publication and beyond, which her family generously gifted to us. There were a lot of duplicates, which I sent to Oregon (for Camp Adair and perhaps other places) and brought to Fort Douglas, where I met with new Museum Director and Curator Patrick Hargis and our main contact, Fiona Robinson, who were thrilled to get everything. A NOTE FROM THE AUTHOR


In the summer of 2022, I discovered the lost wartime letters of my uncle Pfc. Fletcher "Bud" Blanton. He was killed January 10, 1945, in the Battle of the Bulge near Mariaweiler, Germany. Bud Blanton was a Timberwolf, an infantryman with Company D, 413th Infantry of the 104th Infantry Division. He was one of 1,447 Timberwolves who died during the liberation of Europe. The letters and details of his wartime experiences combined with two years of research came together as an inspiring story in book form of one Timberwolf life.

ABOUT THE BOOK

The letters from Timberwolf infantryman Bud Blanton were hidden away more than 75 years by his mother, my grandmother. Most of the letters arrived in his hometown of Nichols, South Carolina, after his death in combat in early 1945. I believe my uncle's two younger brothers and five sisters were shielded from reading the letters by my grandmother. Afterwards, the bag of letters and family photographs ended up locked away for nearly eight decades in an antique cabinet.

My research determined that my mother, one of the eight Blanton children, was allowed to see the letters briefly in early 1945, when she assisted my grandmother in applying for family insurance and pension benefits. I discovered the letters while cleaning the family attic in 2022. During my research, I found the names of more than 30 additional soldiers who served in or had a connection to Company D. I also wrote in the book about their lives after the war.



In December 2024, the University of South Carolina Press published "Dearest Mama: The Lost Letters of a Fallen Soldier and the Stories of Those He Left Behind." It is a record of one Timberwolf family's experience during World War II and afterward. The 176-page book can be ordered at https://uscpress.com/Dearest-Mama.



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ABOUT THE AUTHOR

William S. Walker is a South Carolina-born writer and former soldier who served in Europe. Later, as a reporter and editor at The *Stars and Stripes* newspaper for nearly three decades, he wrote about the WWI and WWII battlefields of Europe extensively. He has studied history throughout his life and holds degrees from Clemson University and the University of South Carolina, and a doctorate in East European History from Ruprecht-Karls Universität in Heidelberg, Germany.
